FAMILY AND FRIENDS SHELTERING IN A REALLY COOL PLACE.....WITH BIG FISH!



In Northeast California, about a four drive from the Bay Area, is a private wilderness getaway with big and feisty rainbows, spectacular hatches, great lodging, mountain scenery setting, and a slice of true nature. Jim Hine had been there before, and he returned for four nights this May with Karen (his "handler"), Karen's two daughters, Emma (14) and Zoe (18), and their two friends, Jacquelyn (15) and Piper (18).

Jim's comments on their experience: "We were all stir crazy from sheltering in place in Marin and San Francisco. We were fortunate to hit the heart of the Hex hatch on these scenic lakes. Several years ago, the owner discovered Hexagenia's in one of his five lakes, probably migrants from Lake Almador or the Fall River. Knowing he had a good thing going, he

transplanted "Hex Mud" into his other lakes, creating an astounding annual event from mid May to Mid June.

With the lodge to ourselves because of COVID and social distancing, we enjoyed lovely dinners each evening, biding our time until the main event, which started around 7:30, when the huge Hex mayflies started popping. From both float tubes and the shore, the dry fly action on big duns and emergers was non-stop until well into the night. Emma and Jacquelyn both caught their first fish on flies. Karen, who is quickly becoming a seasoned fly fisher, was tight-lined almost continuously. In addition to the Hex's, we also hit an incredible three hours of a

massive Callibaetis hatch. Many of the rainbows were very large. Zoe was our photographer and caught the action on her camera, and Piper capped the night setting up lakeshore campfires and 'smores.

We spent the warm days paddle-boarding on the lakes, swimming in the pool and the lakes, birding (Karen spotted 8 species she had not seen before), and hiking. We saw at least two bears, multiple times, and then I made a rookie mistake of leaving my tubes and net at one of the lakes overnight. Bears love to chew up nets with fish slime on them. It was a long faced group when we had to leave to return to COVID self-imprisonment in the Bay Area. But this will definitely be an annual event."

COMBO TRIP - PART TWO: ARGENTINA



This is a combination trip with extreme changes in the environment – beginning with the hot and humid rain forest of the Amazon and ending near the base of the Andes in Argentina. At Fly Fishing Adventures, we define a "Combo Trip" as a trip that combines two different environments in the same general part of the world. We have crowned Dana and John Landis as the Queen and King of the combo trip as they do at least one each year. From the Seychelles/Africa to New Zealand/Borneo, they have traveled the globe with their fly rods and cameras. The early 2020 edition of their combo trip was to South America. It included:

- a week at the Amazon's "fly fishing only" lodge with friends Annette and Rob Pizzie
- touring Buenos Aires for a few days
- a stay at one of Argentina's world class fly fishing lodges
- a four day stop in Bariloche at a fine resort hotel.

A POSITIVE COVID 19 REPORT - BELIZE AND REOPENING

As of May 24: Belize has been COVID free for over 30 days and is the first country in the Americas to report no active COVID cases. Belize has had only 18 confirmed cases since the beginning of the outbreak.

We have over 35 years of experience in observing and dealing with the government of Belize, generally finding their governing unsatisfactory. Given that experience, we were shocked at Belize's efficient approach and prompt reaction to the COVID 19 outbreak – they immediately closed their borders, imposed a strict quarantine, and established very tight policies for public conduct between people. The results, in limiting the impact of COVID 19, have been amazing, especially in comparing to other Central and South American countries.

Guides and outfitters in many places, like New Zealand and Australia, are having a difficult time because, as of now, international travelers are not being allowed into their country. Guide Brett Wolf, in the tiny town of Exmouth on the Ningaloo Reef in the NW corner of Australia, has let me know that the large Giant Trevally fishing inside the reef has been outstanding, but only locals (like Murray Pattison holding the large GT) have been able to experience it.

This photo makes me very jealous. I have hooked five large GT's (50 to 70+ pounds) at the Ningaloo and lost them all to coral

heads. The largest I've been able to boat so far has been only 32#. While I do spend most of my time when fishing here stalking permit, I always allow for some opportunities to cast to these angry monsters – one of fly fishing's greatest thrills is watching one of these guys, 40 feet away, charge your fly in shallow water!
