MORE EARLY SEASON NEW ZEALAND EXPERIENCES



As this newsletter is being written, we are entering into New Zealand's summer period. For most anglers, this is the prime time to visit the land of the Kiwi. However, there are many who annually make their pilgrimage in the early season, before the crowds arrive. One of those is Ruhan Neething and his report and photos capture the reasons why October can be just fine for a New Zealand adventure. Ruhan annually fishes with one of New Zealand's finest independent guides, Scott Murray, who for years was the head guide at Lake Rotoroa Lodge on the South Island: "Over the last few years, I have been trying to get to Scotty as early in the season as possible because, even though the weather can play up a bit, the potential is off the charts in terms of numbers as well as sizes of fish caught. This year was a numbers year for us, not that the sizes were at all bad!

Same as last year, I was his first client again. For me part of the excitement is that even he does not know what will happen and how the rivers will look. So it is almost like fishing new water every day for both of us. This year we hit the rivers running (literally). The first day saw us better his best day ever on a local river, we ended up with 31 fish for the day. And our last day, Scotty rated as one of his best fishing days in 20 years of guiding on a pretty tough river that is known for low numbers. In between these two days is a blur of wild brown after wild brown. I think it is fair to say that I pigged out and definitely caught my share and probably a few other people's as well. Even though the really big fish (10 pounds plus) eluded us, we still managed a respectable average of between 5 and 6 pounds, nothing to scoff at!!

For the first time, I invited a friend to join me and he LOVED it. So much so that he will be back next year, another convert to how amazing NZ can be in October."

FLY FISHING PHOTOGRAPHY 1A: CAPTURING FLY FISHING SCENICS – PART 2

One of the great joys of our fly fishing passion is that it takes us to the most beautiful, pristine environments on earth. Capturing photos that display the beauty of these places and the joy of being there with a fly rod in hand is a challenge. There are two key elements involved in a fly fishing scenic photo.

- 1. a scene that is worthy of remembering.
- 2. a fly fisher has to be part of that scene or all you have is a pretty landscape or waterscape photo.

Below are examples. On the left is a pretty stream meandering through a meadow – a nice landscape photo, but not a fly fishing scenic.....nothing there to tie it to fly fishing like the photo to the right of it (the larger version of this photo shows the rod, reel, and line clearly). Another great example is the NZ photo above by Ruhan Neething (and his photo was shot without the benefit of sunlight!). Below right are two photos of permit flats in Belize shot by William Owens – one is just pretty water and the other is a permit flat! Of course, best if there is some action in the angler's body, but often just the angler standing in the water changing flies with the rod tucked under his arm can accomplish what is needed if the setting is special enough.
